Project Context

Harvard's Strategic Procurement office, with advisory input from the University Construction Management Council (UCMC), established the HU Construction Academy to create a pipeline of skilled Small Business Enterprise (SBE) trade partners. The Construction Academy aims to empower SBEs by equipping them with knowledge, experience, and valuable connections.

The initiative offers targeted training and project experience to broaden the pipeline of skilled contractors working on Harvard capital projects and to expand future opportunities for trade partners to successfully bid and work on Harvard projects.

Harvard's Office for Strategic Procurement has a playbook on how to run a construction academy and our team was excited to support its refinement.

What We Have Worked On

Partnering with Harvard Strategic Procurement, Office for Sustainability, Harvard Business School Operations, Construction Managers, General Contractors, and Trade Partners, our project team helped improve the Construction Academy experience by:

- Updating and refining the Harvard University Construction Academy Playbook
- Creating an accompanying "Introduction to Construction Academy"
 presentation to educate new Harvard stakeholders about the Construction
 Academy in a concise, user-friendly format
- Conducting interviews with representatives of key Construction Academy stakeholders to determine lessons learned
- Proposing refinements for future Construction Academy cohorts

As Harvard continues to serve students and lead in work which protects the climate and environment, advances a more equitable society, and promotes the wellbeing of people at Harvard and beyond, programs like the Construction Academy are critical to supporting this mission from the ground up.
